### Mild/Improving Symptoms? Returning to Work after COVID-19? Living with someone who tested positive? Information for Health-Care Workers

## Symptomatic with Negative COVID-19 Test Results

Health-care workers who have received a **NEGATIVE COVID-19 test result**, and whose symptoms are mild/improving, are permitted to return to work if they are able to answer **YES** to each of the following:

- Tested NEGATIVE for COVID-19 (the following are accepted forms of a negative result):
  - One (1) negative test from a provincial (public) testing site.
  - One (1) negative test performed at a health facility testing location.
  - Two (2) negative self-administered rapid antigen COVID-19 tests, with negative results received 48 hours apart. The date and time of the tests must be recorded.
- Mild and improving symptoms
  - Health-care workers will assess their symptoms as outlined on the following page and determine whether they are "fit for work".
  - · Feel well enough to work
  - Lingering symptoms must not interfere with ability to wear and maintain PPE standards.
- No fever without use of fever reducing medication for 24 hours
  - Health-care workers must be without a fever for a period of 24 hours, without any use of fever-reducing medication.

Health-care workers who are able to answer **YES** to **ALL** of the above, may return to work. Follow standard site specific processes to be scheduled for work.

Health-care workers who experience **NEW** symptoms (one from category A **OR** two or more from category B per staff self-screening tool on following page) must follow standard site specific processes for sick calls and seek testing. They must self-isolate until they have received a negative test result and are able to self-declare they are fit to return to work.



# COVID-19 Positive COVID-19 Test Results (regardless of symptoms)

### A) Fully vaccinated health-care workers

Fully vaccinated health-care workers who have received a POSITIVE COVID-19 test result may return to work on day six (6) following 5 days of isolation, provided that:

- Any lingering symptoms are mild and improving and the health-care worker feels well enough to complete their duties.
- Any lingering symptoms will not interfere with their ability to maintain the PPE standards that are required.
- They have been without fever for 24 hours, without any use of fever-reducing medication.
- 4. They successfully pass the staff self-screening questionnaire on the following page.
- 5. When eating, drinking or taking breaks during days 6 to 10, returning positive health-care workers must take their breaks in non-common areas (as identified by their manager/supervisor) and ensure strict adherence to physical distancing at any time their mask is removed.

Fully vaccinated health-care workers are no longer required to notify Occupational Health of their positive test result or need clearance to return to work. Based on the results of the self-screening criteria, health-care workers should follow their standard site specific process to be added to the schedule when they are fit to return to work.

## B) Unvaccinated, Not Fully Vaccinated or Immunocompromised health-care workers?

Health-care workers who are NOT fully vaccinated and who test positive for COVID-19 must continue to self-isolate for a full 10-day period. Asymptomatic testing must be continued upon return to work.

Immunocompromised health-care workers must also continue to isolate for a full 10 day period. Health-care workers in these categories may return to work after 10 days when they meet points 1-4 above.

### **Close Contact of Positive COVID-19 Case**

### A) Fully vaccinated health-care workers

Fully vaccinated health-care workers who live with someone who has tested positive for COVID-19 can continue to work but must participate in a regular rapid antigen testing regimen.

A supply of rapid antigen test kits will be provided by a testing site or through a process designated by your manager. Test at minimum every 48 hours over a tenday period (the 10 days begin on the day you receive your test kits).

Fully vaccinated health-care workers who are close contacts and have been diagnosed with COVID-19 in the last six months do not need to participate in rapid antigen testing for close contacts.

### B) Unvaccinated, Not Fully Vaccinated or Immunocompromised health-care workers?

Health Care Workers who are NOT fully vaccinated and who live with someone who has tested positive for COVID-19 must self-isolate for a full 10-day period.

#### **COVID-19 Daily Staff Screening Tool**

Staff are required to self-screen for COVID-19 symptom prior to reporting for work.

#### Symptoms - Do you have:

Note: Screening is intended to exclude symptoms related to chronic illness or seasonal allergies.

One symptom from Category A?	Two or more symptoms from Category B?
Fever>38 or subjective fever/chills     cough*     sore throat/hoarse voice*     shortness of breath/breathing difficulty*     loss of taste or smell*     vomiting or diarrhea more than 24hrs*	<ul> <li>runny nose*</li> <li>muscle aches*</li> <li>fatigue*</li> <li>conjunctivitis*</li> <li>headache*</li> <li>skin rash of unknown cause*</li> <li>nausea or loss of appetite*</li> </ul>

Note: If you have one Category B symptom and have not been exposed to COVID-19, you do not need to isolate. Continue to self-monitor and screen for symptoms. Proceed for testing if you develop symptoms.

#### **Definitions:**

**Fully vaccinated staff** are those who have received both doses [any combination] of an approved two dose COVID-19 vaccine [AstraZeneca, Pfizer, Moderna], OR a single dose of an approved single dose COVID-19 vaccine [Janssen/Johnson & Johnson] with more than 14 days having passed since the second dose [or approved sole dose] was received. Staff do not have to have received the booster shot (third shot) to be considered fully vaccinated.

**Not fully vaccinated** means staff who have received one dose of an approved two dose COVID-19 vaccine, or 14 days have not passed since the second dose was received.

**Immunocompromised** refers to those who have a health condition affecting their immune system, including but not limited to being treated for cancer, having had an organ transplant or are taking medication that suppresses the immune system.

Self-isolation requirements

Unvaccinated, Not Fully vaccinated, or immunocompromised staff	<ul> <li>You must self-isolate if:</li> <li>You have tested positive for COVID-19 in the past 14 days.</li> <li>You are awaiting COVID-19 test results.</li> <li>You had close contact with a confirmed case of COVID-19 while not wearing required personal protective equipment (PPE) and/or not practicing physical distancing (6 feet/2metres) in the past 14 days.</li> <li>You had laboratory exposure working directly with biological specimens that contain COVID-19 while not wearing required PPE in the past 14 days.</li> <li>You are a household contact to a member who is symptomatic and was required to self isolate in the past 14 days.</li> <li>You are a close contact to a positive case who was required to self isolate in the past 14 days.</li> <li>You returned from travel outside of Manitoba / have a household contact who has returned from travel outside Manitoba in the past 14 days? Note: if the household contact is fully vaccinated and asymptomatic, or if you are asymptomatic and can isolate yourself from the asymptomatic traveler, then you don't need to self-isolate and you can work.</li> </ul>
